My Values & Beliefs as a Parent

LOVE FIRST – To lead with love means we lead with acceptance, kindness, and the genuine belief in the goodness of ourselves and others. If we lead with love, then we choose our words and actions through this lens. We won't and don't have to love everyone we meet but we can still lead with love. We live this out in our family by talking about how we showed love today and what ways we can show love in the coming days. We talk about who showed love to us. We are quick to ask for forgiveness when we make a mistake, we are quick to forgive, and we help each other with big and small things to lighten the load for everyone. We lead with love, and we end with love, no matter the day or circumstance.

HONESTY - We do not lie to each other or ourselves. If we are uncertain about something, we ask and we talk it out. If we are scared, we seek comfort. If we make a mistake, we acknowledge it. Honesty is important in our family because as a parent I believe it is my job to model not only accountability to each other but to ourselves. I want my children to grow into genuine and authentic individuals who feel grounded and centered in themselves no matter the situation. If they are grounded in themselves, the outside world cannot crack them. We show this in our family by sharing what we struggle with, what we are proud of, and what we do not know. We always encourage asking questions!

RESPECT - We don't have to like everyone we meet, but we can recognize their humanity by showing respect. We respect others even when they might not show us respect. We respect ourselves by how we take care of our minds and bodies and by who we surround ourselves with. If someone is not kind or respectful of us, then we step back and move away because we know we are worthy. I will continue to model this. In the big ways when they've made a mistake, I don't cast judgment; instead, I show them respect and guide them to other choices. But also, in the little things they see me say and do - how I speak to people at the store, on the road, the pets in our home, and the way I speak to myself. Kids are always listening and learning.

CONNECTION – It is important that we stay connected to our family, our friends, and ourselves. I believe we are people created for community and when we isolate or cut ourselves off from those we are connected to, we suffer. Everyone needs their privacy and time alone, but when we are connected through love then we can be miles apart and be together. Remaining connected to our cultures, histories, and communities keeps us grounded in purpose and belonging. We live this value by protecting family time through family dinners every night, and through playing together and working together. We live this by making the effort to visit family far away, by making plans with friends, and by showing up in our community, serving, and celebrating.

EDUCATION – I believe the best way to approach education is through wonder and enjoyment. I believe learning should be fun and exciting and not something dreaded. Learning is a process. I tell students, 'You aren't meant to know everything, that's why you are taking this class or seeking this help.' The point to learning is not the grade, it is the understanding, it is the growth that happens in our brain and spirit when we go through the process of trial and error, mistakes, and understanding. We learn from others in the community or on the playground. We learn when we are challenged by those around us.


Family


